Chemistry

CHEM 304 (000396) [10/B/W] The Environment and You (3 cr)

May 28 – July 1, 2008 Monday-Thursday 12:00-2:00pm

Instructor: Richard Lahti

This course explores the chemical underpinnings of a variety of environmental issues, such as pollution, energy production, and recycling, and how these issues play out in social, political, and economic arenas. Students will also have the opportunity to independently explore three topics in further detail.

Education

ED 408/508 (000410/000411) Human Relations for Educators (3 cr)

Saturdays, June 7 & June 14, 2008 9:00am – 4:00pm, plus 40 hours outside of class Lommen Hall 210 Instructor: Steve Grineski

Web access is required. This course satisfies the Human Relations requirement for the State of Minnesota. The primary audience is licensed teachers and other human service providers. Human Relations for Educators provides a study of personal and institutional oppression in America across social, political, historical and educational contexts. This study focuses on understanding the contributions of various groups; becoming more aware of dehumanizing biases, discrimination and prejudices; and developing classrooms that contribute to positive interpersonal relations. Students will also analyze how stereotypes affect the teaching and learning relationships and how classrooms can become more responsive to more learners.

It is advisable to begin working on the pre-assignment about two weeks before the first class on June 7. Course packets and required texts may be purchased from the MSUM Bookstore in person or via mail. To access the website: <http://bookstore.mnstate.edu/>

Additional requirements or differentiated achievement level for graduate credit is required. Graduate students will develop a short survey for the purposes of better understanding dehumanizing practices and stories of resistance and how teachers can create more inclusive classrooms for more learners. Surveys will be administered to 6 individuals representing diverse groups. A short paper will be developed analyzing the findings of the survey.

MFA 677 (000398) United Kingdom and France: A Study Tour (3 cr)

May 12-27, 2008 Instructor: Alan Davis

This unique writing course will allow you to learn about and experience European literature and culture through an exploration of urban places, spaces, art and architecture, and regional foods. You will visit two of the most important urban centers of Europe with trips centered on London and Paris. You will read books and articles about the places you'll visit. During the trip, you will be able to participate in guided tours and lectures, and create reflective journals about your experiences. Ample free time for your individual writing projects will be provided. Upon your return you'll develop a creative writing project (any genre) about a specific place, building, or space that you visited; alternatively, you'll write a travel narrative. No prior course work is required and there will be no exams.

Graduate students must arrange with the instructor to complete a more substantial project and will be expected during the tour to lecture on an appropriate literary or writing topic of their choice.

MUS 634 (000399) Kodaly Method Level I (3 cr)

The focus of this course is to address 1) The philosophy and pedagogy of Kodaly influenced music education in the U.S. 2) Pedagogy for preschool through grade two and 3) American folksongs collected and analyzed for inherent musical concepts to be used within a sequenced curriculum. **Cost:** Tuition plus \$60.00 workshop fee.

WS 390 (000391) Worlds of Women: Study Abroad (3 cr)

Women's Worlds is, nowadays, the most important international congress on academic research on gender, women and feminist social movements. Ever since the first edition of the congress in Haifa, Israel, in 1981, it has gathered over 40,000 people from around the World. Every three years Women's Worlds goes to a new country and a different continent: the Netherlands, Ireland, United States, Costa Rica, Australia, Norway, Uganda and South Korea.

Hosted by the University Complutense of Madrid (UCM) the conference is expected to be attended by 5000 people. For the first time, the congress will be completely bilingual with Spanish and English as official languages. The conference will take place in Madrid, Spain, from July 3 – 9, 2008.

The Women's Studies program will offer a study abroad opportunity for students to attend the Mundos de Mujeres conference. Students will be able to receive credit by enrolling in WS 390 as stated above.
