### Registration for Continuing Studies

The following procedures and tuition rates are subject to revision by the State University Board.

**REGISTRATION:** A registration form is enclosed with this class schedule for your convenience in pre-registering for evening and off-campus classes. Send this form to Continuing Studies, Box 82, Minnesota State University Moorhead, Moorhead, MN 56563 or fax 218.477.5030.

Pre-registration is encouraged because it is more convenient for both students and instructors. However, registration at the first class meeting is allowed on a space available basis.

**TUITION PAYMENTS:** Term bills will NOT be mailed. Students can view or pay their account online at [www.mnstate.edu/busoff](http://www.mnstate.edu/busoff). Choose Tuition & Fees, then View/Print or Pay Your Bill on Line using a VISA, MasterCard, or Discover credit card. Payments can be made on-line at this time or students may call the MSUM Business Office, 218.477.2221 and pay their bill via phone or by mailing a check or money order.

**STUDENT FEES:** Student Fees for on-campus courses and courses in the Fargo-Moorhead area will be charged on a per credit basis. Students enrolled in off-campus classes are not charged student fees. Students attending interactive television courses at sites outside a 30-mile radius from the FM area will be charged 50% of student fees. Students attending interactive television courses on campus will be assessed full fees.

**RECIPROCITY:** Students from North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wisconsin may qualify for reduced tuition rates by applying for participation in the reciprocity programs. Applications should be made in advance and submitted to the appropriate state agency. **Do not submit reciprocity applications to Minnesota State University Moorhead.**

**TRI-COLLEGE UNIVERSITY:** Continuing Studies courses are NOT open to TCU registration. Students from NDSU and Concordia must register and pay tuition and fees at MSUM. For more information see <http://appserv.mnstate.edu/continue/tcu.htm>

# DISTANCE LEARNING COURSES

## Online and Hybrid Courses

### **ED 422/522 (002412/002413) Electronic Resources: Issues & Practice (2 cr)**

**Online (Desire2Learn): January 12-March 8, 2009 Instructor: Staff**

Issues and Practice will cover many areas of the electronic research process of emerging technology for K-12 teachers. Using computer-mediated communication methods, students will submit assignments electronically (email; Web Board), and will also have hands-on experience in Internet research, along with knowledge and skill building that will transfer across multiple platforms and settings. This 2-credit course will cover copyright laws and determine when and how to use images and music downloaded from the Internet. Participants will learn how the Internet can affect privacy and how to make their own school's computer more "safe". **NOTE: Some online meetings are required. Students will get a choice of times.**

### **ED 425/525 (002414/002415) Methods of Computer-Mediated Communication in Education (2 cr)**

**Online (Desire2Learn): March 3-May 8, 2009 Instructor: Staff**

This course provides an introduction to modern electronic communication tools available to incorporate into education, and experience in using them to facilitate lifelong learning. Participants will learn to use computer-based communication to access information and enhance productivity. Teachers will be encouraged to share professional development resources available via electronic communication with colleagues, ideas for using communication tools and evaluations of their use in education. Ethical issues of using these tools will be explored plus the potential for learning and teaching.

**NOTE: Some online meetings are required. Students will get a choice of times.**

### **ED 434/534 (002416/002417) Assessment Strategies for Tech-Enhanced Curriculum (2 cr)**

**Online (Desire2Learn): March 9-May 8, 2009 Instructor: Staff**

This class will guide educators in the selection of technologies used in assessment, tracking, and reporting of student progress. In addition, this course will look at ways to assess the use of technology in instruction.

**NOTE: Some online meetings are required. Students will get a choice of times.**

### **ED 602 (002477) Statistics in Educational Research (2 cr)**

**Online (Desire2Learn): January 12-May 22, 2009 Instructor: Carol Okigbo**

Basic theory, techniques for using descriptive and inferential statistics, and application in educational research designs.

### **(E1/3) MATH 102 (002333) / Introduction to Mathematics (3 cr)**

**January 9 – May 8, 2009 Instructor: Kris Montis**

Logic, sets, probability and statistics, problem solving strategies. This course does not require extensive math background but does require students have the maturity to schedule the necessary study time. Video lectures, guided notes, practice sheets with answers, as well as regular text are used. **Note:** Restricted to nursing majors only. **Prerequisites:** CCGE 095; MDS 095; MDS 095; PDEV 100; MATH 099

### **MATH 316 (002334) / Teaching Mathematics in the Middle Grades (3 cr) --COURSE CANCELED--**

**January 9 – May 8, 2009 Instructor: Kris Montis**

**Online (D2L)/Hybrid; meets Saturdays from 9:00am–3:00pm, Jan. 24, Feb. 14, March 7, March 28**

This is a teaching methods course for those who want middle school licensure in mathematics. Lectures, quizzes, discussions, and outside assignments are done online and the face-to-face meetings will concentrate on hands-on activities and performance tasks designed to develop teaching skills. Online course time is asynchronous, meaning there is no set time that you have to be online. You may work online as fits your schedule. There are, however, due dates that must be met.

**Note:** Materials and methods of teaching mathematics in grades 5-8. Open only to math majors with a concentration in teaching and to elementary education majors with a specialty in mathematics. In addition to those students who have completed the listed prerequisites, students who are majoring in secondary math education and who have Junior standing may take this course. **Prerequisites:** Math 304

### **SPED 464/564 (002380/001632) / Ed Planning and Adaptation for Students with Learning Problems (3 cr)**

**January 12-May 5, 2009 Instructor: Connie Strandquist – COURSE CANCELED--**

Educational and transitional adaptations for learning disabled or emotional/behavioral disordered secondary students based on individual cognitive, affective, and behavioral characteristics. **Prerequisite:** SPED 463 or consent of instructor.

**SPED 556 (002312) / Functional Assessment and Curriculum (3 cr)****January 12-May 5, 2009 Instructor: Camille Brandt**

The purpose of this course is to develop an understanding of individuals with developmental disabilities as well as a functional, life-skills orientation to assessment and curriculum. Students will perform both informal and formal assessment, write an assessment report, and develop curriculum which allows for integration of students with identified cognitive impairments. Prerequisite substitutions require instructor consent. **Prerequisite:** SPED 513, SPED 519, SPED 571

**SPED 559 (001624) / Communication Programming for Persons with Severe Disabilities (3 cr)****January 12-May 5, 2009 Instructor: Lowell Buysse**

This course covers issues related to communication program and decision-making models for communication programming for individuals with severe disabilities. The emphasis is on assessing an individual's communication skills, selecting appropriate components for the communication system and planning intervention strategies. Prerequisite substitutions require instructor consent.

**Prerequisite:** SPED 519**Self-Paced Courses**

**(Individualized, instructional courses)** – are courses offered to students who are not able to take courses during regular daytime hours. These "Self-paced Courses" are also called "Packaged Courses", and are similar to correspondence courses. They are offered with no face-to-face class meetings. Self-paced courses may include some online components. Students have 3 semesters (including the semester they registered during) to complete the course.

A historical perspective on living, traditional cultures of American Indian groups. Topics include tribal entities, religion, arts, life-styles and ecological adaptations.

**HLTH 110 (002439) / Personal Health (3 cr)****Instructor: Jan Adair**

This class assists students in examining their personal level of wellness, which includes physical fitness, making good nutrition choices, maintaining a healthy body composition, dealing effectively with stress, determining personal risk for cardiovascular disease and cancer, making wise choices in drug use and avoiding abuse, protecting one's self against sexually transmitted diseases and identifying skills for developing and maintaining successful interpersonal relationships.

**HLTH 200 (002440) / Introduction to Health Education (2 cr)****Instructor: Jan Adair**

Explores the foundation and philosophy of health education and health promotion. Other topics include job settings for health educators, professional organizations and licensure, access and retrieval of health information, landmark research and theories of health behavior change. Students will be required to demonstrate effective writing skills.

**HLTH 315 (002441) / Health Agencies & Services (3 cr)****Instructor: Jan Adair**

A survey of community health agencies and programs at the national, state and local levels.

**HLTH 327 (002442) / Safety Education and Customer Protection (3 cr)****Instructor: Jan Adair**

Study and evaluation of factors in safety awareness, accident prevention and consumer protection.

**HLTH 330 (002443) / Disease Prevention (2 cr)****Instructor: Jan Adair**

Introduction to common diseases with an emphasis on primary, secondary and tertiary prevention in health education and health promotion.

**HLTH 412 (002444) / Education for Sexuality (3 cr)****Instructor: Mary Charlton**

This course trains health education majors and minors to carry out sexuality education for students in grades 7-12. Emphasis is placed on developing self-esteem, healthy relationships, and social skills. Current educational research is applied to promote sexual health in children, adolescents, and adults.

**HLTH 465 (002445) / Comprehensive School Health Programs (2 cr)**

**Instructor: Jan Adair**

A step-by-step approach to developing, implementing, and evaluating coordinated school health programs that include school health instruction, school environment, guidance and counseling, health services, food and nutrition programs, physical education, school site health promotion and the development of school and community partnerships.

**HLTH 489/589 (002446/002447) / K-5 Health Education Curriculum & Evaluation (3 cr)**

**Instructor: Jan Adair**

### **Anoka Ramsey Community College (Cambridge) -- BS in Special Ed: EBD**

**ED 343 (002437) / Curricular Issues (3 cr)**

**Mondays, Jan 12-May 13, 2009 6:00-8:50pm Instructor: Barbara Martin**

Curricular issues in general education, including standards-based instruction, current educational debates, and practical applications provide the framework for ED 343. This course is required for students earning licensures in Special Education. **Prerequisite:** ED 205; ED 205E; ED 294; PSY 202

**ED 367 (002438) / Practicum: General Education (1 cr)**

**Jan 12-May 13, 2009 Instructor: Lynn Mahlum**

Field experience in general education classrooms- elementary level and secondary level.

**Prerequisite:** ED 205; ED 205E; ED 294

**MATH 306 (002435) / Mathematics for Special Education (3 cr)**

**Jan 12-May 13, 2009 Instructor: TBA**

Development of content and methods for teaching mathematics in special education setting. Open only to majors and minors in special education. Does not substitute for MATH 406. **Prerequisite:** MATH 304

**SPED 320 (002436) / Educational Services for Individuals with Exceptionalities (3 cr)**

**Wednesdays, Jan 14-May 13, 2009 6:00-8:50pm Instructor: Molly Froemke**

Introduction to the recognition, incidence and educational needs of individuals with exceptionalities. A wide range of educational services are studied with emphasis on the shared responsibility of all professionals in education and related services.

**SPED 471 (002434) / Behavior and Environment Management (3 cr)**

**Mondays, Jan 12-May 13, 2009 6:00-8:50pm Instructor: Mark Krug**

Application of learning theory and applied behavior analysis to teaching and to the problem of altering maladaptive behavior. Specific variables related to classroom and community based instruction of individuals with a variety of learning characteristics are included. Prerequisite substitutions require instructor consent.

**Prerequisite:** SPED 320

**SPED 473 (002433) / Emotional and Behavioral Disorders (3 cr)**

**Mondays, Jan 12-May 13, 2009 6:00-8:50pm Instructor: Mary-Brit Ferguson**

Identification, assessment, and programming for students with Emotional/Behavioral Disorders. Course includes operation of program models of educational and other treatment agents. Prerequisite substitutions require instructor consent. **Prerequisite:** SPED 320

### **MSUM Construction Management Courses on the NHCC (North Hennepin Community College) Campus**

**CM 430 (002423) / Estimating II-Pricing and Productivity (3 cr)**

**Instructor: TBA**

Students will learn the fundamentals of pricing out a quantity survey and the relationship of how productivity factors are used to formulate unit pricing. They will estimate the material, labor, equipment, subcontractor, and overhead cost of the commercial building project that was completed in CM 330. "Timberline" estimating software is utilized extensively as a basis for learning principles of computerized estimating. Job cost accounting procedures are emphasized. **Prerequisite:** CM 330

## **MSUM Operations Management Courses on the NHCC (North Hennepin Community College) Campus**

### **TECH 485 (002421) / Production & Inventory Management (3 cr)**

**Mondays & Wednesdays, Jan 12-March 3, 2009 6:00-8:30pm Instructor: Nancy Norman**

Study and analysis of systems and methods for planning and control of manufacturing resources. The framework of this course is based on the guidelines provided by the American Production and Inventory Control Society. Main topics include master planning, inventory management, material and capacity requirements planning, production activity control, and Just-In-Time. **Prerequisites:** TECH 380; MATH 234

### **TECH 493 (002422) / Occupational Safety & Health (3 cr)**

**Mondays & Wednesdays, March 4-May 5, 2009 6:00-8:30pm Instructor: Deann Schellin**

Designed for students to develop an understanding of basic occupational safety and health terminology, principles, and practices. Course content covers both industrial and construction settings and reflects current occupational standards. Students will be exposed to the development of a safety program and will do a safety site visit off-campus.

### **ED 631 (002426) / Educational Law and Organizational Structure of Education (3 cr)**

**Wednesdays, Jan 14-March 8, 2009 4:00-8:00pm Instructor: Denny Van Berkum**

**Location: Red Lake Elementary School, Red Lake, MN**

An examination of the legislative and judicial actions affecting the public schools. Consideration is given to contemporary legal issues for teachers, administrators, and boards.

### **ED 670 (002428) / Educational Alternatives for Learning (2 cr)**

**Wednesdays, Jan 14-March 8, 2009 4:00-8:00pm Instructor: Layna Cole**

**Location: Red Lake Elementary School, Red Lake, MN**

In-depth examination of established and innovative approaches to instruction across the Pre-K-12 curriculum.

### **ED 694V (002431) / Practicum (2 cr)**

**Jan 12-May 13, 2009 Instructor: Boyd Bradbury**

**Location: Red Lake Elementary School, Red Lake, MN**

A supervised field experience in teaching the graduate major subject. May be repeated if setting varies. Possible settings include elementary, secondary, post-secondary, adult. Consent of major program coordinator and field experience coordinator required.

### **ED 697 (002427) / Individual Study in Education (2 cr)**

**Jan 12-May 13, 2009 Instructor: Boyd Bradbury**

**Location: Red Lake Elementary School, Red Lake, MN**

Independent research for advanced graduate students. Repeated to a maximum of 4 credits.

### **ED 699 (002429) / Field Research (4 cr)**

**Jan 12-May 13, 2009 Instructor: Steven Street**

**Location: Red Lake Elementary School, Red Lake, MN**

ED 699 is the culminating course for the Curriculum and Instruction Master's Degree. Students complete their action research project and capstone writing project, and present these projects to peers and Curriculum and Instruction faculty.

## **Waubun Curriculum & Instruction and Ed Admin Masters Program**

### **ED 519 (002424) / Creating Web-Based Curriculum Materials (2 cr)**

**Jan 12-March 8, 2009 Online; Desire to Learn (D2L) Instructor: Sheri Okland**

This course will assist educators in the design and implementation of a classroom web site containing web-based lesson plans. It will also assist educators with web-based delivery methods and collaborative projects. Participants will create web-based classroom materials and collaborate with others via the Internet to extend the boundaries of the classroom.

### **ED 699 (002425) / Field Research (4 cr)**

**Jan 12-May 13, 2009 Instructor: TBA**

**Location: Waubun High School Media Center, Waubun, MN**

ED 699 is the culminating course for the Curriculum and Instruction Master's Degree. Students complete their action research project and capstone writing project, and present these projects to peers and Curriculum and Instruction faculty.

### **Business**

**BUS 390 (002517) / Finance for Entrepreneurs (3 cr)**

**Tuesdays, 6:00-8:30pm, January 13-May 12, 2009 Instructor: John Cosgriff**

This course is designed for persons with entrepreneurial interests which will provide basic information on sources of capital, structuring business finances, cash flow management, and other important topics for entrepreneurs.

### **CORRICK CENTER FOR GENERAL EDUCATION**

**CCGE 211 (002321) / Death and Dying (2 cr)**

**Wednesdays, 5:00-8:50pm, Jan 14 – March 4, 2009 Instructor: Jarilyn Gess**

This course will explore a variety of losses focusing on issues related to death, dying, bereavement, AIDS and the adjustment to loss.

**CCGE 212 (002320) / Issues in Abuse (1 cr)**

**Mondays, 5:00-8:00pm, March 23 – April 20, 2009 Instructor: Jarilyn Gess**

This course is focused on issues related to abuse. Topics that will be discussed include areas of family violence, spousal abuse, physical child abuse, child sexual abuse, gay and lesbian abuse, elder abuse, and rape. Adolescent abusers as well as sibling abuse will also be discussed. This course will always be graded pass/no credit.

### **HEALTH**

**HLTH 289 (002408) / First Responder (2 cr)**

**Tuesdays & Thursdays 6:00-10:00pm, Jan 20-March 5, 2009 NZ 100 Instructor: Deric Swenson**

Upon successful completion, the Minnesota Emergency Medical Services Regulatory Board (MN EMSRB) will certify students as First Responders. Students will learn to assess and provide emergency medical care in the following: patient assessment, bleeding, splinting, medical emergencies, childbirth, pediatrics, and environmental emergencies. Students will learn oxygen therapy and will be exposed to common rescue equipment. The additional course fee of \$250.00 is payable at the first class. Books are available at the MSUM Bookstore.

### **PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT**

**PDEV 111 (002398) / College Academic Success Strategies (1 cr)**

**Wednesdays, 6:00-7:15pm Jan 28-April 15, 2009 BR 262 Instructor: Janet Sundquist-Schenck**

Both beginning and established students will learn successful methods to take better notes, combat test anxiety, improve memory, and read more efficiently in this course that increases self-confidence as it betters study techniques. This course is highly recommended for students returning to the classroom after some time away.

**PDEV 204 (002322) / The Dale Carnegie Course (3 cr)**

**Wednesdays, 1:30-5:00pm, Feb 18-May 6, 2009 Instructor: Kathleen Paulson**

The Dale Carnegie Course strengthens human relations skills and communication skills. Participants practice the material by applying it to their personal and professional lives. Controlling stress and worry, developing self-confidence, and enhancing leadership skills are also focuses of the flagship course. Registration by special arrangement only. Additional fees apply. **PDEV 207 (002400) / 7 Habits of Highly Effective People (2 cr)**

**Mondays, 6:00-9:00pm, Jan 12-March 23, 2009 BR 264 Instructor: Clifford Schuette**

The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People by Stephen Covey, this course will teach principles of personal relationships that can be applied in personal or business settings. Course work involves a dynamic, experiential learning atmosphere utilizing video, personal application exercises, partner exercises, and small- and large-group activities.

**PDEV 208 (002399) / 4 Roles of Leadership (1 cr)**

**Mondays 6:00-8:30pm, March 30-May 4, 2009 BR 264 Instructor: Cliff Schuette**

This class will present a framework for all leadership activities as they have been articulated by Steven Covey. An overview of the framework and their associated leadership competencies will provide a foundation for determining what is called for in any organizational setting or situation.

### **PHYSICAL EDUCATION/RECREATION**

**PE 107 (002403) / Personal Defense (1 cr)**

**Tuesdays, 7:30-9:10pm Jan 13-May 5, 2009 NZ 131 Instructor: Joseph Killion**

This course provides instruction in recognizing, avoiding, and responding to threats to personal safety. Personal defense terminology and multiple personal defense techniques involving physical contact and falling are emphasized.

**PE 120 (002406) / Tae Kwon Do I (1 cr)**

**Mondays & Wednesdays, 6:30-7:30pm Jan 12-May 6, 2009 NZ 208 Instructor: Roy Gilbertson**

Students are introduced to the various kicks, blocks, self-defense, and techniques of the Korean style martial art, Tae Kwon Do.

**PE 136 (002729) / Pilates (1 cr)**

**Tuesdays & Thursdays, 11:00-11:50am Jan 12-May 6, 2009 NZ 208**

**Instructor: Charmaine Schmidt**

Total body muscle conditioning with focus on abdominals and back muscles. Improve your posture, balance, and flexibility with building strength and endurance.

**PE 137 (002728) / Yoga I (1 cr)**

**Tuesdays & Thursdays, 9:00-10:40am Jan 12- March 3, 2009 NZ 124**

**Instructor: Charmaine Schmidt**

Yoga: All levels welcome to this flow style class that starts with fundamentals and advances your skill level. Learn philosophy and practical yoga in each class. The strength, stamina, and flexibility benefits will last a lifetime!

**PE 138 (002727) / Yoga II (1 cr)**

**Tuesdays & Thursdays, 9:00-10:40am March 5-May 6, 2009 Instructor: Charmaine Schmidt**

Build powerful strength and endurance taking yoga to the next level. Participants must have already taken PE 290 Yoga Level I. This is a flow style of power yoga combined with balance concentration and mindful living techniques. Be ready to take your practice to the next level. **Prerequisite:** Must have taken Yoga I at MSUM.

**PE 189 (002553) / Introduction to Aikido (1 cr)**

**Mondays & Wednesdays, 7:00-8:00pm Jan 12-May 6, 2009 Northwind Aikikai, 824 Main Ave., Fargo**

This introduction course is designed to create a foundation for students interested in the martial arts. The class will be focused on the importance of moving and falling safely in response to changes in balance. As this skill develops, students will progress through most of the requirements for promotion to Gokyu (5<sup>th</sup> degree white belt, 1<sup>st</sup> ranking or step). Simultaneously, students will be developing an understanding of Japanese culture and the longstanding tradition of Budo (study of the martial path). Embracing discipline and spirit of the training is fundamental to the art, and reading material will be provided to facilitate understanding this relationship.

**PE 189 (002375) / Fencing (1 cr)**

**Mondays & Wednesdays, 5:30-6:30pm Jan 12-May 13, 2009 NZ 208 Instructor: Robert Bianco**

Fencing is a class designed for beginners with an interest in the sport of fencing. Fencing is an individual sport which combines strategy with athletic action. The sport of fencing has often been referred to as playing chess with muscles. Fencing is a great way to increase flexibility, stamina, and mental agility. Classical form with an emphasis on modern foil competition will be taught by a US Fencing Association level 1 foil coach. There is a \$20 equipment rental fee.

**PE 189 (002401) / Jiu-jitsu (1 cr)**

**Thursdays, 7:30-9:10pm Jan 12-May 13, 2009 NZ 131 Instructor: Joseph Killion**

Jujitsu is the Japanese Art of Self Defense from which Judo, Aikido, and Taiho Jitsu were born. Jujitsu contains throws, wrist locks, strikes, kicks, and techniques of arrest for law enforcement personnel. Promotions are available through the Seishin Kai of Osaka, Japan. The class is very physical and will require a Judo gi (uniform). A textbook is not required for this course.

**PE 189 (002402) / Judo I (1 cr)**

**Mondays, 7:30-9:10pm Jan 12-May 4, 2009 NZ 131 Instructor: Jana Daeuber**

Judo, meaning "the gentle way", is a Japanese system of self defense and an Olympic sport. This course will focus on judo as a recreational/lifetime fitness activity. Examination and grade will be in accordance with the United States Judo Association.

**PE 189 (Sec I or Sec II) / PADI Open Water Scuba (1 cr)**

**CHIN 390 (002263) / Cultural Tour of China (4 cr)**

**Tuesdays & Thursdays, 3:00-5:00pm March 24-May 5, 2009 MC 272 Instructor: Gregory Stutes**

**Tour dates: May 20-June 9, 2009**

With over one billion citizens and a written cultural history spanning thousands of years, the people of China today are advancing rapidly into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Yet a majority of the population, the peasants, remains very poor. To better prepare MSUM's students to live in an increasing integrated global economy and to critically assess and compare cultural differences, students will participate in several pre-class sessions, a three-week travel tour, and post-tour sessions. This class will take students from Moorhead to an area of the world – China – that is in many ways distinctively different culturally, politically, ethnically, and economically from the United States. We will visit areas that appear advanced compared to Fargo/Moorhead and areas that have changed little since Marco Polo's visit in the Middle Ages.

China will provide a place where students can focus their attention on issues that face many developing countries and explore how their cultural past has affected the Chinese path to the modern times. To accomplish this, the content of the course will take a multi-disciplinary approach. As such, the course will receive Dragon Core credit in the Global Perspectives area building on your critical/multicultural thinking and your written communication. Special attention will focus on Chinese culture and how it relates to a myriad of topics. Students are encouraged to blend cultural topics with the tool skills available in their majors when developing their term paper.
